About Us

When an VIII standard, 13-year-old student, said in a very matter of fact and resigned manner, "I don't have a future", the idea of Anahata United Efforts Foundation was born. That was 2 years ago!

Anahata UNITED EFFORTS Foundation or UE for short is a non-profit organization incorporated under a Section 8 of Companies Act 2013. We engage with underprivileged children in Govt. High Schools, to first instill aspirations in them, leading on to helping them explore their education and career options and finally supporting them to make informed decisions, post X standard. Currently, the children make uninformed choices of education. They typically drift into courses like B. Com and end up as the 'educated-unemployable'. Our aim is to change this into an informed choice. Our engagement is both intensive and extensive, spread over three years, in the crucial adolescent phase of the lives of the students. We believe that this long engagement contributes sustainably shaping their future.



Through a three phased program, running through classes 8th to 10th, we work very closely with our students on a weekly basis nudging them to think deeper about their interests and skills and motivating them to aspire.

DISCOVER: In the first phase, a trained UE team member interacts with the students every week to help them become aware of the details and career options in different industry sectors In an academic year seven to nine sectors like Media & Entertainment, Information Technology, Healthcare industry, Armed forces and more are presented and debated. Students gain crucial understanding regarding the educational pathways that can equip them for each sector.

REINFORCE: The awareness and interest kindled in the students by the Discovery Phase, is given further depth in the Reinforce phase. Reinforce phase builds on the adage 'Seeing is believing'. Students who evince interest in a particular industry sector are taken for half-day field visits to organisations. For example, they visited Madras Engineering Group (MEG) and Para Regiment as part of their exposure visits to the Armed Forces. They visited TVS Motors, Hosur and understood



the dynamics of an automobile company. They interacted with lecturers and researchers of Bangalore University and IIM Bangalore and learnt of the different roles in the Education sector. Ujjivan Small Finance Bank opened their doors and passionately explained how they serve their customers and manage their money. FNF India allowed the students a walk-through of their work areas and departments and explained the efforts involved in process outsourcing. At Dravid Padukone CSE students learnt of the various sports scholarships available as well as the hardwork that goes into training an athlete. Our students were fascinated, at the same time they soaked in the gravitas of each profession.

SUPPORT: This third phase builds on the insights of the first two and provides the last mile connectivity. Knowledge and exposure need to culminate in action, which is accomplished by this phase that takes place in X Standard. Corporate volunteers, who support UE, personally mentor and develop the 21st century skills of our students, enabling them to make informed career decisions. At this stage, parents are brought into the picture to help the students firm up their goals. Setting them up for a trajectory of choice is the crux of UE intervention.



The strength of a program lies in its people and leading the way, are ARCHANA and SHAMALA. Tirelessly they have worked with the students encouraging them, taking them on their visits and helping them express their career plans. Over the summer holidays when Covid hit our student families they could not turn a blind eye to the plight of their student families and they actively supported them with relief materials and direct beneficiary transfers.

Guiding and supporting his team and ensuring smooth ties with the schools is PRAVEEN. A bundle of energy, he can travel from North Bangalore to East Bangalore to South Bangalore and back to North Bangalore, all in a day, tying up various activities. He understands the psyche of the students and engages them effectively, be it in a career workshop or a motivational workshop.





At the heart of our programme is the Product that UE wishes to get across to all the two crore high school students across India. Working closely with the Program team on this endeavor is VERNON, who in a short time, has got to the task of making the Product robust and bilingual. The career content is now available in the form of workbook, videos and presentations.

Passion to work with underprivileged students is the only way to describe OSMITA who heads the volunteer engagement program at UE. Last year, we made a beginning by providing volunteer mentors to two out of the eight schools we work in. Osmita certainly has plans to improve this and ensure every student is inspired and mentored by a corporate professional.





Last but not the least is our Anchor and Guide, KRISHNA. Krishna recently retired from Robert Bosch Engineering as Executive Director and we have much benefited from the clarity of his thoughts and clear vision. Under his guidance we are sure to reach our mission to support every underprivileged student in our country to make informed career decisions and tap into their potential.



From the Founder's Desk

"THEIR future is OUR future" is the strong belief that makes my team and I wake up every morning and work towards our mission of ensuring our students have a good shot at their future and they win over poverty with their potential.

Puneet said, "Ma'am will you please guide me to fill in the Army application form?" It was some time since we returned from a visit to the Madras Sappers campus in Ulsoor. Nearly two hundred students had participated in the visit. Many had joined us for the visit. Post the visit some realized the hardships involved in the Armed Forces. There were also many whose interest had been further strengthened, like Puneet. They were now crystal clear in their ambition to serve the nation, in uniform.



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A shy girl, Monika would quietly take notes as we presented different sectors week after week. She would not participate nor would she interact with us much. But, after a year and a half of exposure, when it was time to draw up career plans, Monika's plan was well thought out and clear. She explained shyly that she enjoyed drawing and imagining stories and that she wanted to be an animation artist. If this plan does not succeed, her backup plan is to be a physiotherapist.

It has been two fulfilling academic years of working with Govt High School students through 8th and 9th grades. They have been exposed to career opportunities in class, taken on exposure visits and nudged by mentors to dream big. As they move into 10th grade in this challenging COVID year, our team is taking the responsibility of delivering on those Career Plans very seriously.

The support provided by the teachers and HM of the schools along with the Block Education Officers has been extremely encouraging. Their constant interest and feedback to building the future of their students beyond X std is truly commendable. Our journey has just begun and Team UE will not rest until we have reached the 2 crore students who are studying in High Schools wondering "What Next?"





Schools and Students



Having successfully piloted the model in 4 govt./aided schools in Bangalore, and gaining the acceptance of students, teachers, HM and BEOs we wanted to test the model with a larger base and started the academic year 2019-20 by working in the 8 Govt. High Schools in the picture above.

In the academic year 2019-20, we worked with 2,773 students - 1400 girls and 1373 boys.

1,218 students from South Bangalore or S3 Educational Block and 1515 students from East Bangalore or S4 Educational Block.


In S3 Block, Puttenahalli GHS and Gnana Degula Govt. Aided school continued with the UE career guidance program, while Hombegowda GHS and Agara GHS were the new schools where the program was conducted this year under the guidance of BEO Shri Mathi Gowda.

In S4 Block, Varthur GHS and Immadihalli GHS continued with the UE career guidance program, while Kadugodi GHS and Hoodi GHS were the new schools where the program was conducted this year under the guidance of BEOs Shri Saleem Pasha and Shri Hanumantharaya.

Career Aspirations of 9th Graders

After slowly building awareness, providing exposure and cultivating critical thinking skills, our 9th graders took some time to arrive at their Career Plans. They noted down their first choice or Plan A and incase, that plan did not work their back-up plan, or Plan B.


In the charts below are the comparisons of Plan A and B, first of the girls of 9th grade and then of the boys of 9th grade. The plans of both the genders look intuitive, and what we might have arrived at logically. Girls want to become teachers and doctors, while boys want to join the armed forces or the police force. But what is interesting is the fag end of both the charts. Not many want to become beauticians, mechanics or construction workers. They want their education to steer them towards their aspirations.



Career Plan A vs. Career Plan B of 9th std. Girls

A combination of Plan A and Plan B indicate that girls are tending towards opportunities in *Education, Healthcare, Government services like the Armed forces, Police and Civil Services, and Media and Banking too.*

Job security seems paramount in their minds. Peaking of opportunities in media in Plan B is an interesting aberration.



With boys, job security and pride of uniform seems to be topmost and hence they seem to be keen on opportunities in *Armed forces and Police. Sports, Engineering and Media* again are other choices that are peaking amongst boys.


Opportunities in *Hospitality sector, Agriculture, Manufacturing, Social services, construction and vocational skills* appear in the back-up plans of our male students.

Student SWOT Analysis

As a precursor to drafting their career plans, students were guided to reflect on their strengths and opportunities and note down their weakness and threats. Similar to Career Plan, this exercise was conducted with a 1000 students of Class 9 across 8 Govt High Schools.


STRENGTHS

The top 3 strengths, Hands-on-skills, Arts and Sports and Academics are in conjunction with the career aspirations of our students. 2% of students believed in their leadership skills and critical thinking skills.



WEAKNESSES

405 students were brave enough to admit that gaming/talking on their phone and watching TV was their biggest challenge. *They were honest to accept that anger and lack of patience were areas that require correction.* Students also identified that they would need to take more responsibility towards their academic work.




OPPORTUNITIES

50% of our students felt that their parents' support is their biggest opportunity. They are confident that they will get the necessary support from their parents to pursue their passion. The rest are relying on scholarships and support from NGOs.



Students showed maturity beyond their years to identify that their biggest threat was from themselves. Students poured out their many issues here right from *fear of exams, having to focus on part time jobs and academics, lack of interest in academics, home environment not being conducive, responsibility of siblings and grandparents, drugs to eve teasing.*



The way ahead is not easy. A quick fix will not work. There are a million opportunities out there with few takers. The classic supply- demand conundrum!

As much as we want more boys and girls to benefit from their education and make their mark in the employment market, the odds are against them. Parents from the underprivileged background are keen on education for their wards but they have their own mindsets and community issues that they need to battle.

Some of the challenges our students face on an everyday basis are:

- Uneducated parents and family members who think their responsibility ends with sending their wards to schools. In other words, lack of guidance and support.
- Noisy environment at home (parents fighting is a very regular issue in many households) and neighbourhood.
- Unclean/ unsafe homes and neighbourhoods
- Having to take on the responsibility of elders/grandparents and little siblings when the parents are away at work
- Significant presence of drugs in neighbourhoods around school and home
- Single parent homes
- Parents concern over educated girls not finding suitable grooms in their community
- Economic compulsions leading to poor nourishment and part time jobs

Undoubtedly the challenges are many but the impact UE program can have on a poor family and the confidence of the student is exponential. Students from underprivileged background are generally street smart and practical which is a great quality for encouraging the development of a strong human resource pool. Let's together show them the way to overcome obstacles and achieve their best dreams by leveraging education!
